COND.:Sunny and clear early, warming throughout the day; west winds at 5mph; around 3:15pm a coldfront moved in from the west, turning cloudy, then dark with lightning, winds W/NW at 10-15mph, and a thunderstorm, lasting until about 4:30pm; much cooler and cloudy after that.
